Differing Perceptions of BW Threat and Compliance

POINTS OF AGREEMENT

A State Party could maintain a breakout BW capacity while appearing to remain in compliance

Terrorists are more likely than States to use BW

States are more likely to use BW on a small scale than in a mass-casualty attack

POINTS OF DISAGREEMENT

Likelihood of attack on livestock/crops?

Number of non-state actors interested in BW?

Compliance of all states?

Necessity of legally binding verification protocol?
